

The three degrees of the Red Cross of Constantine will be conferred following the morning chair degrees. The degrees are the Knight of the Red Cross of Constantine, Knight of the Holy Sepulchre, and the Knight of St. John the Evangelist.

Lunch will be provided for a donation. All members of the Red Cross of Constantine are invited and encouraged to attend. This will give you the opportunity to receive the degrees beyond the Knight of the Red Cross. Be in attendance to complete your Red Cross degree experience.

Royal Order of Scotland Conferral



The Royal Order of Scotland is an invitational and honorary masonic body. For a mason to be considered for membership he must meet the

requirements as set forth by the Order. Those invited must be either Knight Templars or 32 degree Scottish Rite Masons. Additionally, its members have to state their believe in the trinity as a Christian.

The Order usually hosts two conferrals of the Degrees of Heredom in the United States. In 2024, the two conferrals were held in Tampa, Florida and Des Moines, Iowa. At the Des Moines conferral, the state selection chairman, H. Wayne Rector, was accompanied by four worthy Sir Knights who received admission into the Order. Sir Knights Justin D. Crippen, Andrew G. Mosley, Gary A. Mason, and A.J. Pence, made the journey to Des Moines and were received and admitted into the Order. There were other candidates selected who were unable to attend the conferral and will receive the degrees in 2025.

It was a fantastic day to discuss what the York Rite is doing and how they can continue to help others in the state.



York Rite College Annual Meeting

Convent General of the Sovereign York Rite College of North America held their annual meeting in Louisville, Kentucky, during the first weekend in August. Many of the members of the York Rite College of Kansas were in attendance for the meeting. These included John T. Staton, Wayne H. Rollf, Allan D. Jackson, and L. Kent Needham.

At this year's meeting, the annual conferral of the Order of the Purple Cross was held. This year, Companion L. Kent Needham was honored by receiving the Order. The Order of the Purple Cross of York, the highest honor of the College, is conferred upon those members of the College who have distinguished themselves by their service to humanity or to the Rite. The recipients are designated Associate Regents of the Sovereign College, and from their ranks are chosen the Regents or active members of that body.



At the annual meeting, those who have been proposed to receive the honor of the Order of the Purple Cross for 2025 were elected and will be notified of their preferment from the College.

The York Rite Sovereign College of North America exists primarily to be of service to the York Rite of Freemasonry. Constituent colleges must declare fealty to the Grand Lodge of their respective jurisdictions. The pre-requisite for membership, which is by invitation only, is good-standing in all four York Rite bodies: Lodge, Chapter, Council and Commander or Preceptory (Canada.)

The York Rite College has an education program. The Companion Adept of the Temple program is open to any York Rite mason. The program is a self-study course which walks the student through the degrees and orders of the York Rite of Freemasonry. The course is divided into five sections. The exams cover the degrees of the capitular rite, degrees of the cryptic rite, the Orders of Chivalry, and York Rite Traditions in Freemasonry. There is a cost for the program because it includes the resource materials necessary for the exams and the study. The exams are made up of multiple choice, true-false, and essay questions. It is a good opportunity to learn more about the York Rite so you can spread that light and knowledge among the rest of the craft.

The Commemorative Order of St. Thomas of Acon



The Commemorative Order of St. Thomas of Acon is an invitational chivalric and Masonic order. In the United States of America, the Order is governed by the Grand Master's Council, which warrants local Chapels of the Order. Chapels may be grouped into larger administrative units, known as Provinces, as needs require.

A candidate for admission must be a subscribing Master Mason in a Craft Lodge in amity with the United Grand Lodge of England, a subscribing Royal Arch Mason in a Royal Arch Chapter, or its equivalent in other countries, in amity with the Supreme Grand Chapter of England and a subscribing Knight Templar, or its equivalent in other countries, in amity with the United Religious, Military and Masonic Orders of the Temple and of St. John of Jerusalem, Palestine, Rhodes and Malta.

The Order of St. Thomas of Acon was established in 1974 as a result of twenty years' research in the Guildhall Library in London by John E. N. Walker, who for many years was the Secretary General of the Societas Rosicruciana in Anglia. The ancient records of the Order, written in medieval French and Latin, had been deposited in the Guildhall Library and escaped the Great Fire of 1666. The Order now operates under the official title of The Commemorative Order of St Thomas of Acon.

The revival of this very English Order of Chivalry is due to the untiring efforts of its first Grand Master, Sir John (Walker) of Dorking, who spent twenty years searching the archives of the library for information about the Order of St. Thomas of Acon, and he felt compelled to revive the Order, albeit Masonically.

Athelstan Past Grand Rank Appointments

At the 2024 Annual Meeting of the Grand Court of the Masonic Order of Athelstan in England, the Grand Court, and its Grand Master, elected several Court Master Masons to receive Past Grand Rank in the Order in England. There are few of these Grand Ranks awarded each year, and those who have set themselves apart by their service to the Craft in general, and to the Masonic Order of Athelstan specifically, are selected to receive the preferment of Past Grand Rank.



The newly formed Ashmole Court No. 181, which meets in Emporia, Kansas, had four members who were nominated, elected, and received First Appointment Past Grand Rank.

Court Master Masons Robert D. McClarty, L. Kent Needham, Delmus "Dale" Morrow, and Patrick C. Carr, all received preferments from the Grand Court of Athelstan. All three are Past Masters of the Order.

Brothers McClarty, Needham, and Morrow, each received the rank of Past Grand Senior Warden in the Masonic Order of Athelstan.

Brother Carr received the rank of Past Grand Banner Bearer in the Masonic Order of Athelstan.

Congratulations to these Brothers on their election and reception of Past Grand Rank in the Order in England.

Scarlet Cord 3rd Grade Conferral in Kansas



In 2022, an idea was had to start an ingathering for the three Councils of the Allied Masonic Degrees in the state. Since that first ingathering in October of 2022, another Council has been constituted and another grade of the Scarlet Cord has been permitted to be conferred in Kansas.

The first year of the ingathering saw the conferral of the First Grade of the Scarlet Cord. In 2023, the Second Grade conferral was added. The Grades of the Scarlet Cord are usually conferred either in England, or at Masonic Week in Alexandria, Virginia, in February of each year.

The first three grades can be acquired by any member of the AMD. The fourth grade can only be conferred upon Past Sovereign Masters of the AMD and then only at Masonic Week.

Fortunately for Kansas, we have been allowed to add the Third Grade of the Scarlet Cord for the 2024 Ingathering to be held on October 12, at the lodge hall in Newton, Kansas.

There are currently only five members of the AMD in Kansas who hold the third and fourth grades, and this will be an opportunity to add another large group to membership in the third grade of the Order.



Irish Masonry and the Grand Lodge of Ireland

The Grand Lodge of Ireland is the second oldest grand lodge in the world. They are second only to the United Grand Lodge of England which was formed in 1717. The Grand Lodge of Ireland was formed in 1725, however the exact date has been lost to the annals of time. There has been presented evidence of the lodges operating within Ireland prior to the 18th century. The Dublin Weekly Journal posted an article on June 26, 1725. The article stated the Grand Lodge of Ireland on June 24th to install their Grand Master, Richard Parsons, the First Earle of Rosse (O'Connell, 2014). This implies the Grand Lodge of Ireland was operating prior to this date; however, they have chosen to use June 24, 1725 as their official celebrated founding date.

There is evidence of masonry being a part the Irish community much earlier than the 1725 recorded date. The Trinity Tripos, a manuscript dating to the 1680s, mentioned Irish masonry and the Craft (Duke of Leinster Lodge, 2014). The manuscript was a speech presented by Mr. John Jones, at the commencement ceremonies of the University of Dublin on July 11, 1688. In the speech, Jones made a passing mention of the craft and stated, "freemasonized the new way." This is an allusion to the change from operative to speculative masonry and something which was mentioned in a passing within the text. It is believed the text was written as a satirical piece by Johnathan Swift, however scholars still continue to debate the validity of the statement. Regardless of the author, the Trinity Tripos was a satirical look at the fraternity of freemasons of the time period.

More evidence can be found with the Baal's Bridge Squares. Baal's Bridge was constructed in 1507 as a crossing for the River Abbey. The bridge is known in the Irish vernacular as "Droichead Maol" which translates to the bald bridge. This could be because the bridge had no parapet or retaining wall. The bridge was dug up and demolished in 1830. During the demolition, two brass squares were discovered laid in the foundation of the bridge. These brass squares were in bad condition because of the decay but someone laid a piece of paper over them and made a charcoal rubbing. The words on one square were, "I will strive to live with love and care" and on the other, "upon the level and by the square." One had the date inscribed upon it as 1507 (Traveling Templar, 2014). So, there was freemasonry active in Ireland in 1507 it would seem.

England possessed the Halliwell Manuscript, or Regius Poem, and the Schaw Statutes to point to the existence and history of early freemasonry in England. Ireland did not have many of those same documents to turn to for an early look at pre-grand lodge Irish masonry. There was in existence, several chairs located in Ireland which point us to the history of Irish masonry before the formation of the Grand Lodge in 1725. One such chair belonged to a brother mason and was used in Derry Lodge No, 134, which met in Lurgan. It was used at one point by the Master of the lodge. The chair has inscribed upon it "AJR" and "KCB" across the top. Beneath that is a traditional Irish harp which is surrounded by the square, the compasses, and the level. Beneath is inscribed the date 1681 (O'Connell, 2014).

Another such chair exists in St. Nicholas Church, located in Carrickfergus, in County Antrim. This chair is almost identical to the previously mentioned chair with a few differences. The date on the bottom is inscribed as 1685. The working tools of masonry are not located on the chair however, above the harp is the square and compasses in the usual masonic manner (O'Connell, 2014).

The York Rite of Freemasonry

The York Rite, or more correctly, the American Rite, is based on the early remnants of Craft Masonry that were practiced in the early 1700's. The formation of the first Grand Lodge of England in 1717 specified that the lodges were to confer only the first three degrees of Craft Masonry.

Three bodies were later formed to work the degrees no longer controlled by the lodges. The Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, Council of Royal and Select Masters, and the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar. All three bodies are technically autonomous Masonic entities, only the requirement of membership in the Royal Arch connecting the Cryptic degrees and Chivalric Orders together.

DeMolay Legion of Honor

The Annual DeMolay State Conclave for Kansas was an exciting event. The afternoon started with a wonderful catered meal for lunch, and was followed by the private investiture of the 2024 Class of the Legion of Honor members. Quite a few of the Kansas York Rite Masons received the honor this year. Some of those included Most Worshipful and Right Eminent Brother and Sir Knight Robert D. McClarty and Brother, Companion, and Sir Knight Matthew D. Rutkowski. The public investiture



followed soon after the private ceremony and a practice was held for the event. There were quite a few York Rite masons in attendance from across the Jurisdiction to witness this great day in the history of the Order of DeMolay in Kansas. Congratulations to all who received preferment at the 2024 Conclave!
